

## RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 2023

These are the results of the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch for 2023. This year the survey ran between 27<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> January during fairly benign weather with temperatures around 6-8<sup>o</sup>c with mainly light winds (although increasing on Sunday) and mainly sunny skies.

This year people contributed to the survey from 16 locations in Plumpton & East Chiltington and recorded a total of 35 different species as shown below.

Jackdaw came top of the chart once again with a substantial increase in numbers over last year, primarily due to a remarkable 56 being recorded in just 3 gardens. It was encouraging to see increases in numbers of Blue Tit and House Sparrows.

Only 2 species (Blue Tit and Robin) were recorded in all 16 gardens.
